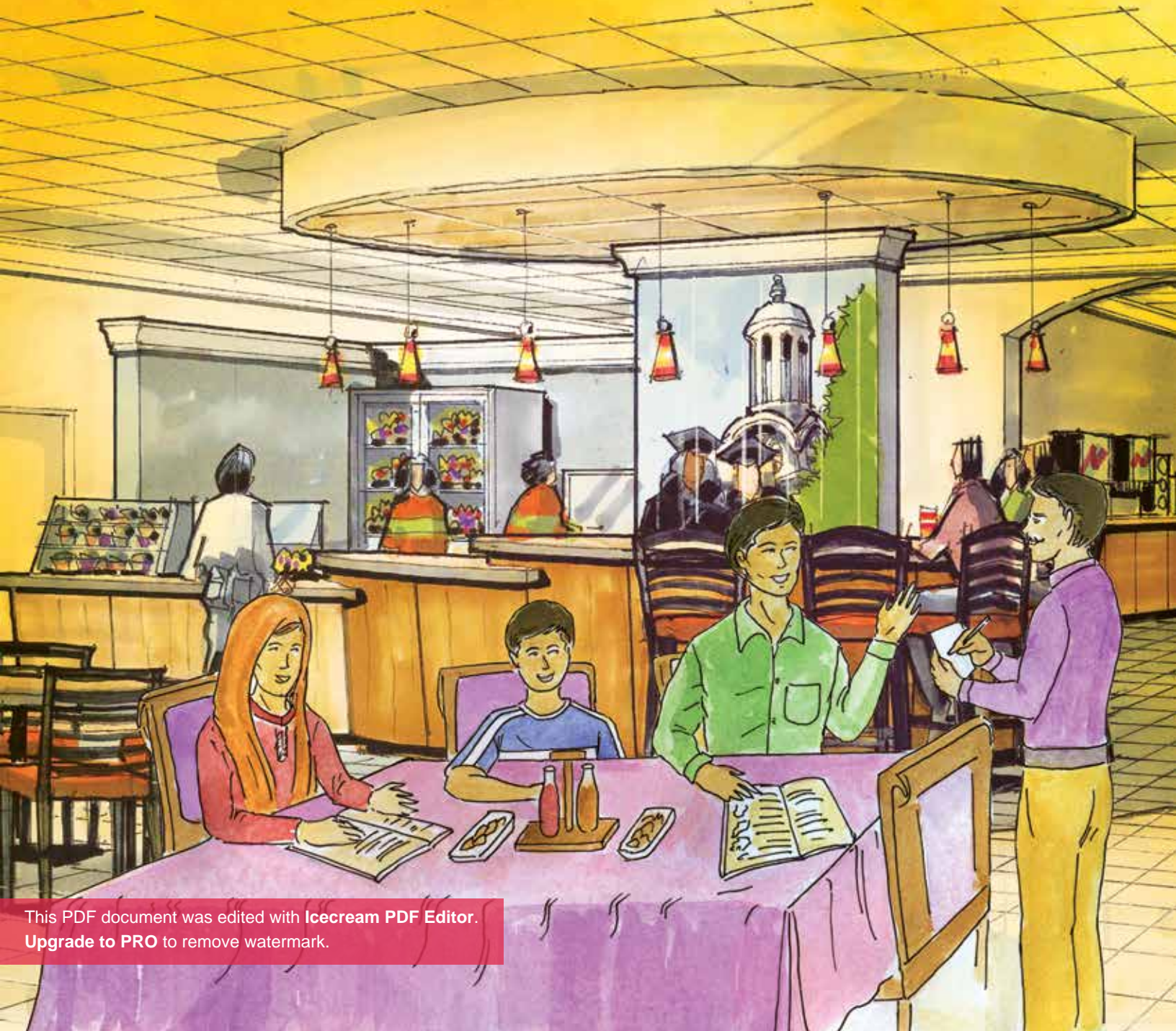


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'Whose' and Apostrophe (')

Concept

- When we want to know the ownership of something we use the word *Whose*.
- We use apostrophe (') with noun to show ownership of something in answer.

Student: That is *Hamad's* seat.

Teacher: *Whose* drawing book is it?

Student: That is *Khurrum's* tie.

Ahad: That is my *cousin's* school.

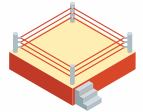

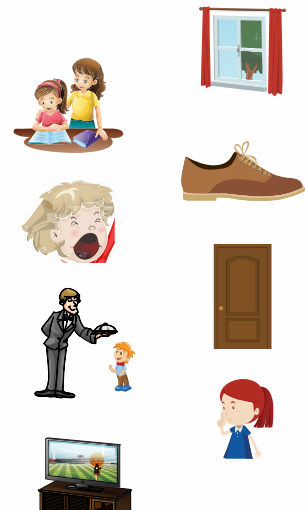

Concept

There are four types of sentences basically.

Declarative Sentence:

A sentence that says a simple statement.

Interrogative Sentence:

A sentence that asks a question or permission for something.

Exclamatory Sentence:

A sentence that shows strong feeling of joy, excitement, or surprise.

Imperative Sentence:

A sentence in which we give advice, instructions, command or make request.
